## St. Georges Day



The following correspondence was sent to me and I pass it on as you may be interested. I know nothing about this company and so cannot comment.

**Dear Sir/Madam.** I am writing to encourage you with the work that you are doing, and to suggest an opportunity for a group get together where the children you work with week by week can discover new skills and be challenged!

The Big Blue Rock is a climbing wall in the Bluewater Shopping Centre, Greenhithe, Kent.

We can organise an evening of fun, where your Beavers, Cubs, Scouts or Explorers can get to know each other and discover new skills, be challenged and stretched according to individual needs. If you fancy trying a new activity, please come and give us a try. We offer a programme of rock climbing, abseiling and team challenges to extend and enthuse your group.

Our prices are a £20 booking fee, which guarantees you a 2 hour time slot at the climbing wall. This is payable in advance. In addition, a further £5 is required per climber on the day to cover insurance, equipment and instructors.

More specifically, we can tailor climbing training programmes to suit a smaller group of Scouts/Cubs who may want to work towards specific badges. The Scout 'Adventure Challenge' specifies climbing as an activity that could be undertaken in order for the badge to be fulfilled. Students can attend for 3 or 4 sessions to discover safety aspects and learn the basics of climbing and fitness. A fitness regime can be offered which may enhance your 'Fitness Challenge'. In addition, we run a Junior Club three times a week, which keen climbers may join in order to work through a range of challenges and opportunities. This may suit those wishing to work specifically towards their 'Climber' badge. We also run trips to the sandstone rock faces around the area of Royal Tunbridge Wells, where climbers can try their skills on real rock and discover the challenges 'real' climbing can offer. Weekend trips can also be arranges if necessary.

Those wishing to work on the above skills can do during pre booked slots, arranged by yourself on a group basis or the Scout and their family on an individual basis. Specialised tuition is £20 an hour. Those wishing to learn skills by joining our 'Junior Club' would be charged a £20 membership fee and then £7.50 per session if they attend one session a week, or £5 a session if they attend twice or more each week. Sessions last 2 hours and are availiable 9-11 Saturday morning, 20:30 – 12:30 Sunday morning.

Climbers should be wearing trainers, trousers/shorts and a t-shirt (no vest tops).

I am pleased to enclose a group booking form that you may print out and post, or email electronically. Please telephone to discuss your needs, and availability, prior to completing the form should you be interested in bringing a group along to try out something new, exciting and challenging!

Charity events

The climbing wall is available for hire for charity events like charity abseils or sponsored climbs. All equipment and instructors are provided in the cost. Cost £35.00 per hour or £200.00 per day.

Sandstone Climbing £200 a day for 4 climbers.

#### The Newslink Interview

This month Newslink interviews Pat McCann, CSL at 1st Braeside Cubs

Hello Pat, thank you for taking part in the Newslink Interview What jobs have you had in Scouting and what is your current position? I have really only had one job – Akela. I was an ACSL for about 5 minutes then got promoted. I am currently also a TA.

What interest do you have outside Scouting Cooking, running, food, running, eating, running, oh and my lovely family.

What was it that attracted you to Scouting and how long have you been involved? Not sure 'attracted' is the right word. I was keen for my son to join as he wasn't a team sport type so I thought Scouting would suit him. It did. He joined in 1994 when he was 9 but the Akela was struggling so Nicky Craig stepped in and was looking for parents to help. Ha! I'd ticked the box. Ha! That was it, hooked. I and Barry Sharp volunteered to help along with their young helper, Ricky Iles.

Scouting continuously changes its image to keep up with the times and to stay attractive to young people. Do you think it succeeds at this and what do you feel have been the best improvements over the past 10 years?

Yes I do think we manage to keep up with the times and there has been a big improvement in the marketing of scouting activities. The best thing was Peter Duncan becoming Chief Scout.

Is there anything that you feel hasn't worked as well during recent changes? Content of the Power Pack. (Power Pack is the Cub Scout Handbook) The colour and look is good but it's missing most of the information that I think the Cubs & parents want to look up. Not many 8 year olds have their own computers for looking up the criteria for the Martial Arts badge.

Some people feel that children these days are so into computers and electronic games that the traditional scouting games are too old fashioned. Do you agree or do you feel that there is still a need for this sort of thing?

I do not agree at all. Scouting offers so much that isn't available any more for young people. Outdoor freedom, wide games, learning survival skills, being with nature. Not one Cub has ever said to me that they missed anything electric at camp. Although there was the visiting Beaver who assumed he was lining up with his dirty dishes to put them in the dishwasher.

Do you think that children of cub age have more allergies and conditions now than a few years ago or is it that there are just more 'labels'?

I haven't noticed much of a change actually, it goes through phases. There have been some camps where the 'puffers' were lined up in the first aid tent but I currently have none.

As a TA do you feel that the training new leaders receive helps them to cope with discipline and control of a pack or is more aimed at rules, regulations and planning? Well, that depends on what modules you're doing! I think the new training system is excellent and will be even better when everyone understands it better. Rules and regulations need to be learned and I do believe in running sections by the book so everyone knows where they stand. However the very best way of learning how to run a section, to provide discipline and a good programme in a fun and positive way is for Nicky Craig to show you how to do it. i.e. a good and experienced Leader to run with you for a few weeks. (Nicky Craig was a leader and ADC cubs in the past who helped to train Pat)

Your Group has recently gone through an amalgamation of  $1^{st}$  Hicks and  $2^{nd}$  Braeside, is this working well for you and are you enjoying your new HQ?

Well it works for me! Yes we've settled in really well and we love our new HQ. Since 1994 I've gone from the old hut at the top of The Drive (25<sup>th</sup> The Drive), no grounds, to 2<sup>nd</sup> Braeside at the URC Church Hall, no grounds, to the 1<sup>st</sup> Sevenoaks with woods and flat grass area and campfire circle and storage hut and big HQ with lots of wall to put posters on. We are very happy to be part of a bigger Group with 5 sections and a GSL.

Pat, if you were Chief Scout for a day what 'over the top' thing would you do to promote Scouting? (money no object!)

I would buy the Millennium Dome. As you enter it there would be staircases going off in different directions with a big door at the top of each of them. Through each door would be a fully functional 'Scouting experience': campsite with tents and backwoods cooking; open field with a wide game going on; campfire in action; raft building by a lake; canoeing down some rapids; pioneering; ....... get the idea? Through another door would be a circular kitchen with an enormous round table in the middle with work stations and small

peninsulas jutting out and opposite each would be an AGA and I could teach lots of people to cook. Of course that's nothing to do with Scouting but it's a lovely fantasy.

#### Bob a Job and The Good Turn

Going through some old archives recently I came across some Bob-a-Job publicity material. Of course almost everyone in Scouting has heard of Bob-a-Job Week but it would seem you had to be there at the time to know just what a big thing this was.

Everyone in Scouting from Cub (there were no Beavers then) to Commissioner were tasked to do jobs and earn at least 2 'bob' which would be used towards the services of Imperial Headquarters. Any money collected over the 2 bob could be used locally. So far all sounds simple?

The following paragraph is taken from a the Bob-a-Job leaflet Feb. 1961

#### The Good Turn

Some concern has been expressed that the introduction of the Bob-a-Job Scheme has led to a lessening of the carrying out of the Good Turn. The Good turn is a fundamental of Scouting

And it is of the greatest importance that Scouters should continue to impress upon their <u>Scouts</u> that during this one week in the year <u>only</u> do they seek to offer their services for payment, and that during the remainder of the year, and indeed during Bob-a-Job Week itself, the spontaneous Good Turn should be carried out without thought of reward.

In some Groups the tradition has been built up of returning later on in the year to those providing jobs during Bob-a-Job Week in order to carry out further jobs, without payment of any kind, as a 'thank you' for the assistance given to Scouting. It is hoped that more and more Groups will adopt this splendid idea.

How times change.

To all those completing the Food Hygiene Examination. This was the first course of its kind run by the Scouting Association in Kent.
